I am very grateful for the support from the Suncoast Information Specialists (SIS) that enabled me to attend the 2016 American Library Association (ALA) conference this year! I found the conference to be an educational and rewarding event, and am so appreciative that I was able to attend as one of the SIS Scholarship winners. This was my first ALA conference, and thanks to the support of the SIS scholarship I was able to learn and experience so much as a first time attendee!

As a first time ALA attendee, I was a bit overwhelmed by the scope and span of the conference, especially by the daunting task of selecting the best presentations and programs that fit my librarian track. I have to commend ALA on their wonderful website and mobile app! These valuable tools helped me to plan out my entire conference and to streamline my selections for sessions. There were so many quality sessions to pick from, that I often had multiple sessions on my schedule during the same time slots! I was hesitant to select sessions held in different venues, as the conference was held across 2 concourses of the convention center and at several hotel conference centers, but all were within walking distance and connected by walking bridges, or you could opt to take an air-conditioned bus if the heat was too much!
